Did you know that an open door signifies communication and access? It's a perfect symbol of MUST's commitment to meet people and serve them at their points of need. In 2015, taking care of 32,000 people a year was like taking care of an entire town, but two-thirds of this town were children... the most vulnerable affected by poverty.

MUST helps our neighbors in need through effective, empowering programs and the compassion of Christian love. Walk through our doors and see how lives are changed.

ACCESS to food

One of the most critical challenges for those in poverty is hunger. MUST provides many resources to ensure no one is hungry and needs are met.

- Three food pantries distribute groceries to 16,894 clients who received 334,436 lbs. of food.
- 80,833 meals were prepared and served in the Loaves and Fishes Community Kitchen.
- 303,245 sack lunches were prepared and delivered to children across eight counties during MUST's 20th season of Summer Lunch.
- 850 Thanksgiving boxes were distributed in Cherokee County.
- Daily breads and sweets are always available to those in need.





ACCESS to housing

Stable housing is a significant goal for those experiencing poverty. MUST features an extensive housing program to meet a wide range of unique needs and provide lifechanging hope.

- 67,416 safe nights of rest
- 829 served in Elizabeth Inn Shelter
- 286 served in diverse housing programs, including programs serving those who are permanently disabled, veterans, single mothers and people in need of brief housing support to assist in moving to independence
- Cold weather shelter





ACCESS to employmen

Earning a livable wage is the answer to many of life's financial struggles. MUST's comprehensive employment program provides coaching and training to help more people move from instability to stability – empowering them to find meaningful employment and the dignity of providing for their families.

- 595 people found employment through MUST, amounting to \$9.3 million in earnings returned to the local economy
- Step Up Your Game, an innovative employment training program designed to teach necessary job search and interview skills to help people succeed.
- ServSafe certification provides access to careers in the food industry
- OSHA training and certification provides valuable skillsets in the areas of workplace safety, forklift operation, construction and warehousing





Clothing is a basic need, yet affordable clothing is a challenge for those in poverty. Appropriate interview attire, school clothes and shoes, warm winter and seasonal clothing, work boots and other clothing items are vital for success and personal dignity. Three clothes closets and a thrift store called MUST Marketplace are resources reaching thousands of people in search of clothing.

- 15,192 people came to MUST for clothes and 360,443 articles of clothing were distributed
- More than 3.800 children received new underwear, socks, hats, scarves, gloves, blankets, school supplies, books and toys at the MUST Toy Shops in Cobb and Cherokee, thanks to the generosity of the community.


ACCESS to compassion
